Thankfully, your community pharmacist can now provide immediate advice and treatment for women with uncomplicated Urinary Tract Infections.² Your community pharmacist can also provide a referral to a general practitioner for further investigation, if necessary.

The permanent service costs \$ and will take up to 15 minutes. Your community pharmacist will have a discreet consultation with you to discuss your symptoms and provide immediate treatment or a referral.² If you are diagnosed with a Urinary Tract Infection you may be prescribed with antibiotics.

Don't worry, you're in safe hands. As a primary healthcare professional, your community pharmacist has completed at least five years training, a compulsory training course to participate in this permanent program and undergoes mandatory continuing professional development.

HOW THE SERVICE WORKS



1. INFORMATION & CONSENT

- Your community pharmacist will provide you with information about the service, including fees and requirements.
- Before the service, your pharmacist will verbally confirm your consent to participate.

2. SCREENING AND ELIGIBILITY QUESTIONNAIRE

Your community pharmacist will ask you a series of questions to confirm that
there are no signs or symptoms of a 'complicated' Urinary Tract Infection, rule
out other conditions with similar symptoms to a Urinary Tract Infection, or any
other issues requiring further investigation by a general practitioner.

3. THE OUTCOME: TREATMENT OR REFERRAL

- Should your community pharmacist determine that it is appropriate to provide treatment, they will supply an appropriate medication for you.
- If it is not appropriate to supply a treatment option to you, your community pharmacist will refer you to a general practitioner for further investigation.

4. RECOMMENDED CARE

- Your pharmacist will provide you with an individualised printed service summary or printed referral letter at the completion of the service.
- These documents can be provided to your regular general practitioner.

5. FOLLOW-UP CARE

Seek medical attention straight away if:

- Your symptoms are not improving within 2 or 3 days after starting antibiotic treatment.
- Your symptoms return within 2 weeks after finishing antibiotic treatment.
- You have symptoms of a kidney infection (fever, chills, back or side pain, nausea or vomiting).
